Narrative Writing: A narrative is a story you write or tell someone. The plot and a memorable story line are important when writing a narrative. It can write from your own experiences, or created from your imagination.

What is a plot? The plot is a sequence of events in a story. It includes the following: characters, setting, problem, events (try to solve the problem), and a solution.
