



HOW TO READ POETRY

Read the following informational paragraph. Then answer the questions that follow.

Poetry is different than a story. Poems are often written in short lines rather than in sentences. They may have patterns of rhythm and rhyme. Some poems called free verse don't follow any rules. Because poems use shorter lines a poet often chooses his/her word selection carefully. Words are chosen for their feeling and description as well as their meanings. Poems can be written on any topic or subject. They can be humorous or serious. It is recommended that you read a poem more than once. First, read it just for enjoyment. Next, read the poem to find out what it means. Lastly, read the poem and examine it for patterns of rhythm and rhyme and word selection. Poems are not only fun to read but they are great fun to write.
