PUNCTUATING DIALOGUE



When characters speak to each other it is called dialogue. Quotation marks are used to punctuate dialogue. Quotation marks show a speaker's exact words. A comma sets off what was said from who said it. A direct quote always starts with a capital letter.

Emily remarked, "I just finished my homework." "What is your favorite book?" Maria asked.
