

WHEN TO USE RISE AND WHEN TO USE RAISE

Rise means to get up or go up. Something rises on its own.
Raise means to lift or to grow. Something raises something.

Examples

When the play is ready to begin the curtain rises. The teacher asked the students to raise their hands.

Raise is a regular verb, rise is irregular. (see past tense)

Present Tense	Past Tense	Past Tense + Helper
rise	rose	has/have/had risen
raise	raised	has/have/had raised
